## Hall of Famers vs. Team Season Records

The article in the fall issue of the Coffin Corner about the futility of the 1964-1967 Washington Redskins, despite there being 4 (5?) Hall of Famers on the roster, caught my attention. I have done some research on Hall of Fame members and after reviewing it, I agree that the Redskins were the most consistent losers with four or more Hall of Famers.

However, there are several other teams that had bad seasons, even though they had an impressive number of future Hall of Fame players. The all-time loser was the 1958 Green Bay Packers (1- 10-1) with seven (7) Hall of Famers (Ford, Gregg, Hornung, Nitschke, Ringo, Starr and Taylor).

To date there have been 23 teams with 4 or more Hall of Famers that have managed to have losing seasons:

Some of the Hall of Famers may not have been available for all games due to injuries or other reasons. The 1945 Bears had Stydahar, McAfee and other players for only part of the season due to military service.

The team with the most Hall of Famers was the 1961 Green Bay packers with 10 (Adderley, Davis, Gregg, Hornung, Nitschke, Ringo, Starr, Taylor, Tunnell and Wood). The leading Hall of Fame teams:

The most future Hall of Fame players involved in an NFL game would have been 17 in the Packer (10) - Colt (7) match-ups in 1961. The Packers won the first game in Green Bay, 45-7 and the Colts took the second in Baltimore, 45-21.

TRIVIA: Can you name an NFL Championship team without a single Pro Football Hall of Famer on the roster?

Answer: Easy, the '89 49ers.

Okay, trick question. Lots of people on the champs of the '80s will EVENTUALLY be in the Hall. They've already started carving busts for Joe Montana, Lawrence Taylor, Mike Singletary and a whole wing of others. They're just not eligible yet because a player has to be retired five years. So, allow for eligibility and a few "declining years." Name an NFL Championship team — pre-1981 — without a Hall of Famer on the roster.

Start with 1980 and work back. And back. And back. You have to go all the way back to, believe it or not, 1920 Akron!

And, of course, the league wasn't called the NFL then. So the real answer – none.
